

Fishing Update for The Missouri River in South Dakota

Warm and sunny days are ahead this week! Take advantage of the sun while it shines and get out on the Missouri River in Central South Dakota. Good luck catching!

REMINDER: Help stop the spread of Aquatic Invasive Species! Check out the [Game, Fish & Parks web site](#) for detailed info on the regulations. They are very specific so you'll want to be sure you've read the regulations. If you love to fish the Missouri River in South Dakota, please do your part to keep the reservoirs free of aquatic invasive species.

[Lake Oahe](#)

In the [Pollock](#) and [Mobridge](#) areas the fishing is picking up when the weather warms up. North of Mobridge is a little better bite but the bite south of town is starting to pick up a little. Anglers are using jigs and minnows or bouncer/spinner/minnow.

At [Akaska](#) the walleye are biting in the bays. Anglers are using jigs and minnows in 20-40 feet of water. Northern are also being caught from the shore. Some of the water is a bit muddy in places but that's clearing up.

At [Gettysburg](#), the fishing is good. Smallmouth, catfish, and northern are all biting well. Walleye are a little slower but that will pick up as the weather and the water warms up. Anglers are using jigs and minnows anywhere from shallow water out to 20-30 feet.

Around [Spring Creek](#) / [Cow Creek](#) limits of nice walleye are coming in along with some smallmouth bass. The water temperatures are warming up, but rainy weather is still a factor making some areas muddy. Northern and catfish are being caught in shallow water with smelt rigs. Pitching jigs to shore is working well for many anglers, along with bouncers and minnows or crawlers in 5-20 feet of water.

[Lake Sharpe](#)

Around [Pierre/Fort Pierre](#) anglers are catching walleye in 10-20 feet of water using bouncers and minnows or crawlers. Recent rains have caused some muddy water making Lake Sharpe a little more challenging but limits are still coming in. Nice weather days are seeing limits of walleye, smallmouth, and catfish coming in.
